7-Intended Learning Outcomes

The industrial training, considered as some sort of On the Job Training (OJT), is supposed to realize the following intended learning outcomes:

1. Knowing what is going on in the areas of activities in both design and operations phases
2. Being aware of the essentials of operations, way of running business, equipment used, health, safety and environment (HSE)
3. Developing and acquiring real life skills
 - Learning and Self-Learning Skills
 - Managerial skills: Planning, organizing, observing managing business
 - Communication and Presentation Skills, and Networking
 - Taking Initiatives
 - Intellectual and Thinking Skills: designing, problem solving, analytical skills
 - Implementation skills: observing, sharing, handling, monitoring, controlling, following up and improving

Try to do as much as you can of the assignments and list of tasks given to you. One may argue that coverage of some of these tasks might require more than the time of the training. This is true, particularly for the unprepared student. If it happens that a planned task on your list is not scheduled in operations, consult the many sources of information available to you, and build your knowledge about it. Later this knowledge will be very useful for understanding all phases of the task when you see it in real time operations. Learning this way is a matter of positive attitude, willingness to learn, clarity of vision; all are good bases for fast career progress and promotion.
